Successful candidates will be appointed ESTRO FELLOW for a period of five years, and will receive an ESTRO FELLOW diploma and their names will be posted on the ESTRO website.

To renew their ESTRO Fellow at the end of the initial five-year period, Fellows must continue to demonstrate high levels of achievement in all aspects of their professional practice by continued involvement in high quality training, education and research in compliance with the European Core Curriculum. In short, ESTRO Fellows must demonstrate continuous commitment and a high standard of professional knowledge and skills.

If you want to be distinguished for your competencies in radiation oncology, consider becoming an ESTRO Fellow. Being appointed as an ESTRO Fellow will prove your dedication to the profession and to ESTRO and will in future be seen as the pinnacle of a radiation oncologist's career.

The ESTRO Fellow will be introduced gradually: in 2011 for radiation and clinical oncologists, later on for medical physicists in the field of radiation oncology, radiation technologists and biologists.

• WHAT •



ESTRO is delighted to announce the **ESTRO FELLOW**, which will promote higher standards of care for our patients as well as enhancing the standing of radiation oncology and participating clinicians.

- The ESTRO Fellow promises to boost international standards of radiation oncology and the professionals practicing in the specialty, and to act as a mark of distinction for clinicians who have demonstrated high standards of care and commitment.
- ESTRO will involve its Fellows in the activities and organisation of the Society, and ESTRO Fellows will be preferentially considered as candidates for ESTRO activities such as education, research, information, guidelines and public relations.
- Being appointed as an ESTRO Fellow will in future be seen as the pinnacle of a radiation oncologist's career and ESTRO Fellows will for sure become a model of excellence and commitment for their colleagues, patients and the public.
- ESTRO Fellows can add the designation  to their name and signature to indicate their qualification as an ESTRO Fellow.

• HOW •



To be awarded as an **ESTRO FELLOW**, candidates will require to fulfill a number of stringent criteria.

- First, they must be board certified specialists in radiation or clinical oncology, with at least two years post training experience, and they should of course be ESTRO members.
- Second, candidates must have at least 50 ESTRO credits, which can be acquired through a range of ESTRO activities such as attendance at ESTRO conferences and courses, participation in online educational programmes, and publications in the Journal of Radiotherapy and Oncology.
- The next step is registration. Candidates are required to complete the application form and provide a copy of their logbook and curriculum vitae (resume), or complete a detailed ESTRO questionnaire.
- Eligible candidates can then sit the ESTRO Fellow examination - the first opportunity to sit the examination will be in London in May 2011. The examination will comprise a multiple choice question paper lasting 120 minutes with each question having just one correct answer. Questions will cover all aspects of radiation oncology. To help candidates prepare for the examination a database of reference documents will be available from the ESTRO School.
